The Grade 6 Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ curriculum aligns with the liturgical calendar, honoring the various seasons and the unique feelings and colors they represent. Through a variety of biblical stories, students will explore the emotions and significance associated with each Church season. Each season emphasizes different theological aspects that guide us through the narrative of our salvation. The units' content both informs and shapes our students' understanding. By utilizing their unique talents and faith experiences, teachers play a role in evangelization as they share and nurture the faith. The Grade 6 Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ program effectively supports the Church's mission of evangelization.

In Grade 6, your child will discover the six components of catechesis in a suitable and captivating way through five units focused on the liturgical year, featuring the following themes:

Unit 1: God Calls Us to Know Him Unit 2: O Come, Divine Messiah

Unit 3: Answering God's Call to Serve

Unit 4: Take Up Your Cross Unit 5: Gather Us Together

Religious education holds a vital and fundamental role in the culture and life of a Catholic school.
