By exploring various biblical narratives, students will gain an understanding of the significance and atmosphere of each Church season. Each season presents distinct theological themes that guide us through the narrative of our salvation. The unit content educates and shapes our students. Teachers, utilizing their talents and testimonies of faith, share the message of faith as they pass it on. The Grade 5 Growing in Faith, Growing in Christ curriculum integrates seamlessly with the Church's mission to evangelize.

In Grade 5, your child will discover the six components of catechesis in a suitable and captivating way through five units focused on the liturgical year, featuring the following themes:

Unit 1: The Gift of Our Faith

Unit 2: Called to Gather in Faith

Unit 3: Called to Live a Moral Life

Unit 4: Celebrating the Paschal Mystery

Unit 5: Rooted in Dignity and Living Our Faith
